Rats & Mice on Your Property

A Guide for Property Owners

If you find rodents on/in your property consult with a professional pest control company that is well trained in managing rodents about treatment

Interesting Points:

- Rats typically live outside while mice typically live inside of structures(homes)
- Mice are more curious than fearful, rats are more fearful than curious. Mice are more likely to explore an environment than rats.
- Mice have poor eyesight
- Rodents can not chew through metal or metal items (i.e. 1/4 inch wire mesh, steel wool)
- Rodents travel along the perimeters of walls, fence lines etc.
- Remove food, water, shelter and ways to get around on your property — Don't make your garbage their food

Cleaning up after Rodents:

- ⇒ Always wear gloves & wash your hands after
- ⇒ Use WET methods of cleaning (dry methods will stir up dust that you don't want to breathe
- \Rightarrow Use a disinfectant or a mixture of bleach & water. Spray product on dead rodents, nests or droppings BEFORE picking them up
- ⇒ MOP floors, wet-clean countertops with disinfectant/bleach, steam clean affected upholstered furniture & carpets
- ⇒ Dispose of items in a bag and into a covered trash

Rats

Evidence that Rats are on your Controlling Rats: property/yard:

- ⇒ Nests or Burrowscommonly found under bushes, plants, and in dirt. Are I-4 inches wide with smooth edges
- ⇒ Moist, dark (and larger in size) droppings
- ⇒ Holes & Gnaw Marks on Wood, Plastic Bags & Garbage Cans
- ⇒ Worn Down Runway Paths along walls & grass-Rats run along the same path many times

Sources of Food Include:

- ⇒ Bird Feeders, Bird Seed, **Grass Seed**
- Domestic Pet(s) Food & Water Bowls
- ⇒ Domestic Pet (s) Feces
- ⇒ Uncovered Garbage & Recyclable Bins
- ⇒ Ponding of water on yards
- BBQ Grills, Compost pile

- ⇒ Get Rid of Clutter! Clutter gives rats places to hide, nest & reproduce!
- Clear out your yard & keep it free of weeds & trash



- Store items away from walls & off the ground (i.e. firewood piles)
- ⇒ Control Weeds, Shrubs & Bushes!
- Keep tall grass, bushes & shrubs trimmed and away from building foundations
- Avoid dense planting
- Store food in tightly sealed containers—hard plastic & metal containers are ideal

How to Keep them Out:

- Seal all holes and cracks in foundations, walls, floors, underneath doors, and around windows. Rats can fit through openings as small as a half inch!
- ⇒ For small cracks, gaps & holes use: caulk mixed with steel wool, roofing cement,

metal door sweeps, metal flashing, & metal



screens

- For larger areas use: heavy gauge sheet metal, wire mesh sealed with ready-mix cement
- Seal pipes leading into buildings with escutcheon platescheck pipes for leaks.
- Close burrows with soil or with metal or use cement filler for burrows in cement



Mice

Evidence that Mice are inside your home:

- ⇒ Nests made from fine. shredded paper or other material resembling a woven ball ~4-6 inches
 - wide
- ⇒ Smaller droppings
- ⇒ Gnaw marks



Sources of Food Include:

- Seeds, grain, fruits, vegetables, pet food
- Human Food: foods high in fat, proteins & sugars (bacon, chocolate, butter, nuts, cereals)
- Wild: roots, plants, leaves & stems, insects & insect larvae

Prevention & Control:

- Mice can fit through openings as small as a quarter inch!
- Seal all gaps & cracks through out your home using similar methods as above in areas like: Windows, Garage(s), Garage Doors, Foundation, Chimney, Exterior doors, Attic, Basement, Water Pipes, Vents
